Build capacity for conducting HIA's in local health departments and to promote the field of HIA and the tools for HIA practitioner use. In the presentation the purpose of the tool for HIA practitioners, other local health agencies and staff of agencies outside of the health sector, along with an annotated catalogue of quantitative models that can be used in a HIA and other types of assessments will all be described. The session will describe: (1) What modeling tools can be applied to active transportation, physical activity, nutrition, traffic congestion, education, and land use sectors; (2) data inputs that are required to run the model; (3) health and non-health related outcomes the model will predict; (4) geographic/political context; and ease of use.
